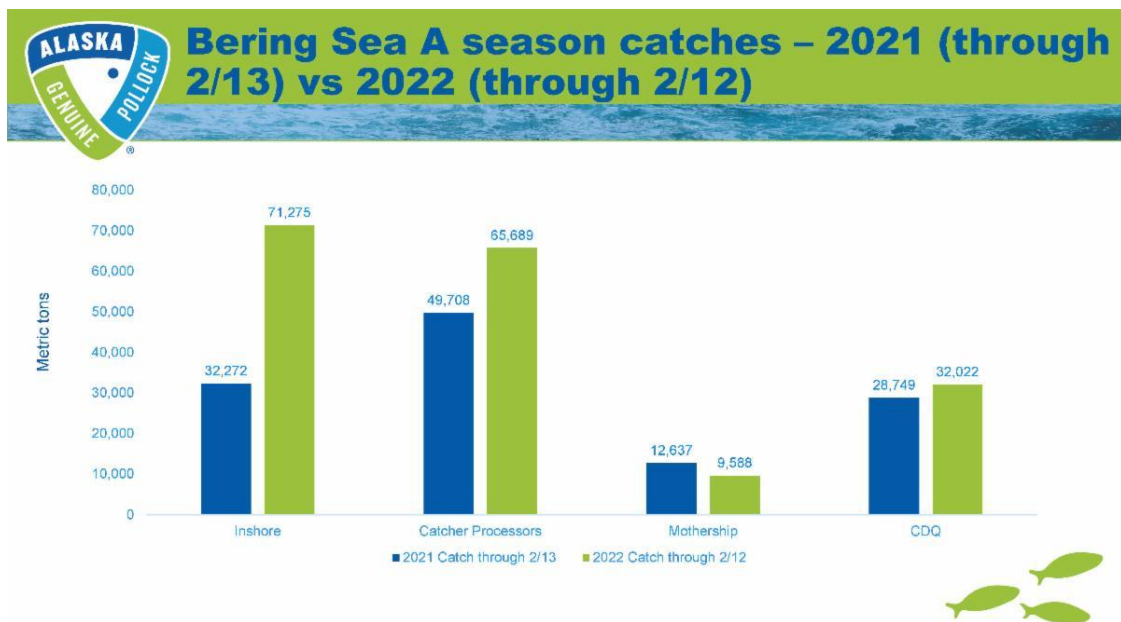


On this update I do have some information on how Alaska is looking for Alaska Pollock & Cod.

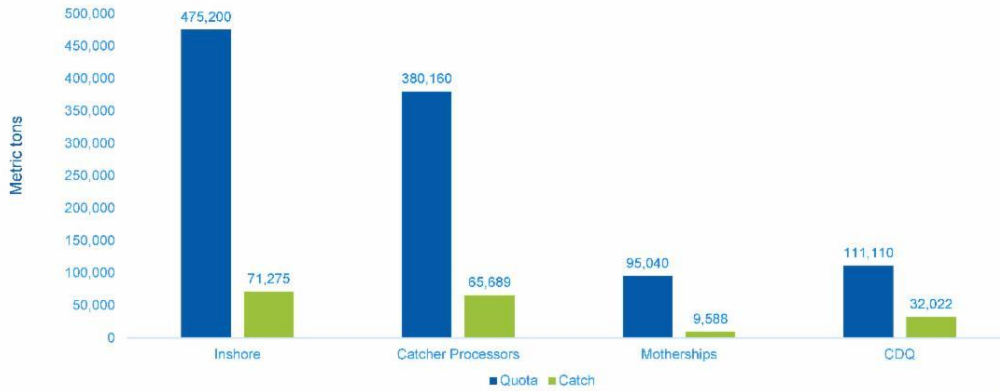
We of course are seeing a better harvest so far in 2022 than we did last year. As last year all of the processors had Covid 19 issues not only on the vessels but in their land based plants as well. So far as of 2 weeks ago we had landed 3% of the overall quota for 2022. Below are some graphs that will show you where the catch is at and what forms are being processed. Please keep in mind that the most if not all of the Catcher Processor and Mother Ship product that they produce is Fillet Block and not IQF Fillet. Only shore based processors are able to economically produce IQF Fillets. Even with that, it will still be hard for the shore based processors to produce the IQF Fillet with the labor challenges that we all are facing in most if not all industries.

Below are the graphs that show where we are at in the harvest with Alaska Pollock. On the cod front we do not have available as much data and all we are able to supply is that we have now harvested just 14% of the overall TAC for 2022, which is nice to see this early in the season. We should still start seeing some products arrive to our Tacoma DC mid to late March.



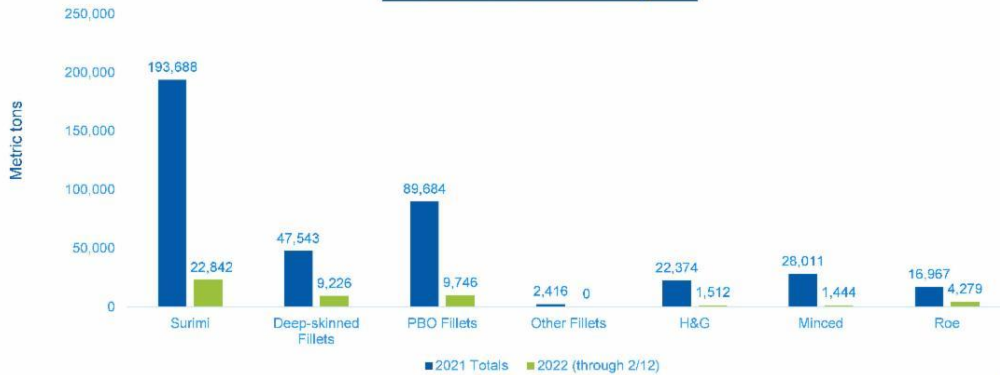


Alaska Pollock catch (through 2/12) vs full year quota – Bering Sea
